

Callista Roy, Ph.D., RN, FAAN is a Professor Emeritus at Mount Saint Mary's University, Los Angeles and at the Connell School of Nursing, Boston College. She has been a Sister of St. Joseph of Carondelet for over 60 years. Her college education began with a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in nursing at Mount St. Mary's College, Los Angeles; followed by master's degrees in pediatric nursing and sociology at the University of California, Los Angeles, and a Ph.D. in sociology at the same school. Her post-doctoral studies were in neuroscience nursing at University of California at San Francisco. Dr. Roy is a highly respected nurse theorist, known for her development and continual updating of the Roy Adaptation Model—a widely used framework for theory, practice, and research in nursing. Books on the model have been translated into many languages and the model is cited extensively in scholarly books and peer-reviewed journals worldwide. She has chaired and served on numerous doctoral dissertation committees. She was inducted into the American Academy of Nursing in 1978 and honored as a Living Legend in 2007. Other awards received were for her contributions to advancing nursing science with the National League for Nursing Martha Rogers Award and the Sigma Theta Tau International Honor Society for Nursing Founders Award. An inaugural inductee into the Nurse Research Hall of Fame of Sigma Theta Tau International, Dr. Roy has also received six honorary doctoral degrees. In 2021 she will receive a life time achievement award from Sigma Theta Tau International for the global impact of her work. (261 words)
